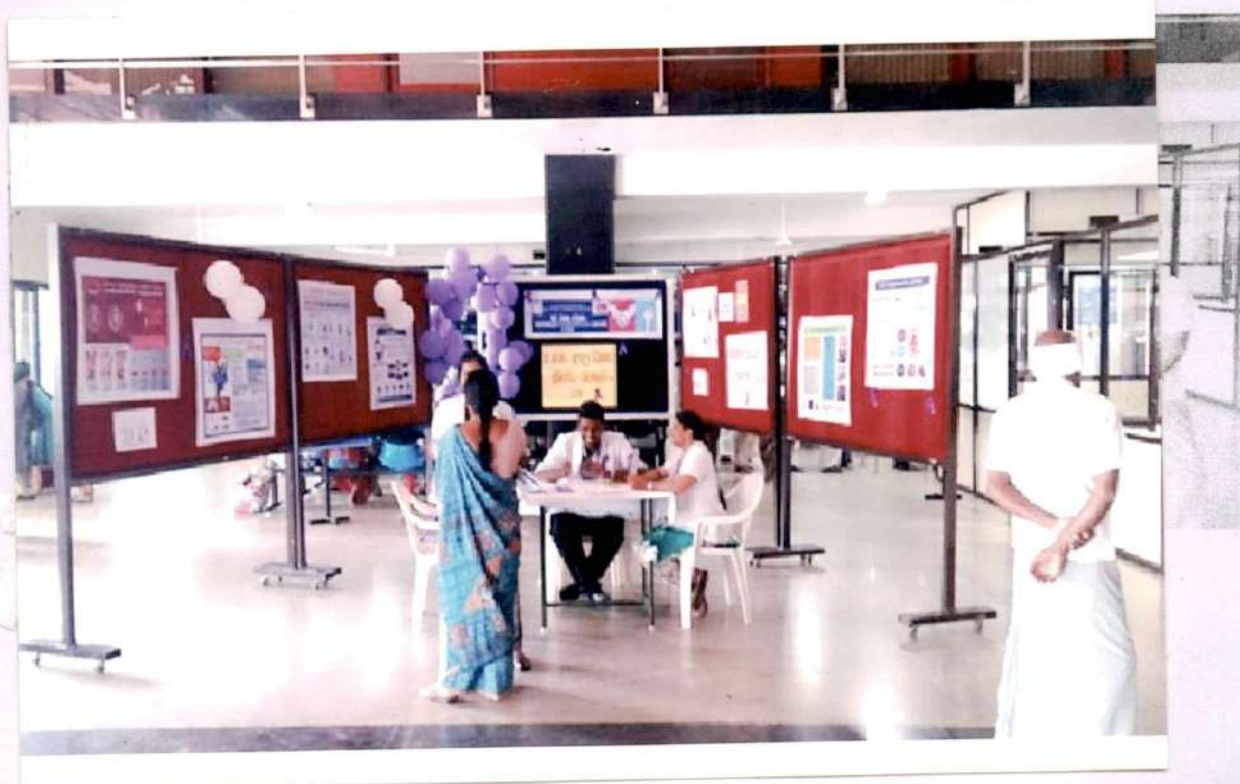

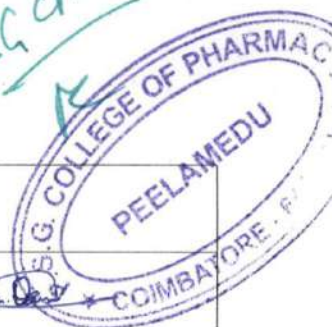

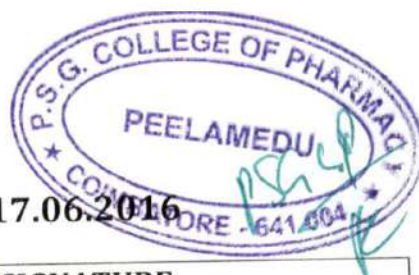

Department of Pharmacy Practice, PSG College of Pharmacy conducted a Diabetic awareness Program at PSG Urban Health centre on 14th November from 7.00 am to 4.00 pm. Diabetes is a chronic disease that affects many people worldwide. In 2014, 8.5% of adults aged 18 years and older had diabetes. In 2016, diabetes was the direct cause of 1.6 million deaths and in 2012 high blood glucose was the cause of another 2.2 million deaths. Interns and M.Pharm students along with the faculty members conducted a diabetic awareness camp to raise the awareness for Diabetes, to check the glucose levels and to educate necessary precautions. The students were splitted into groups and activities like Blood Pressure measurement, Data collection Patient Counseling video and flex explanations regarding diabetes and blood sugar measurements were done. 3 M.Pharm students and 14 interns participated.



During the event, Blood Pressure and glucose levels were measured and necessary counseling was done to general public. Also video clippings and flex were used to give awareness against diabetes and to encourage its prevention, early detection, Proper lifestyle changes and treatment among the public.

Medicines prevent, treat or manage many illnesses or conditions and are the most common intervention in healthcare. However, it has been estimated that between 30% and 50% of medicines prescribed for long-term conditions are not taken as intended (World Health Organization 2003). Optimizing a person's medicines is important to ensure a person is taking their medicines as intended and can support the management of long-term conditions, multi morbidities and polypharmacy. The safety of medicines is another important consideration when optimizing medicines and can be a continual challenge. A report commissioned by the Department of Health, Exploring the costs of unsafe care in the NHS, found that 5% to 8% of unplanned hospital admissions are due to medication issues. This report focused on preventable adverse events which can be attributed to a specific error or errors. Incidents involving medicines have a number of causes, for example: lack of knowledge, failure to follow systems and protocols, interruptions (for example, during prescribing, administration or dispensing), staff competency, poor instruction, and poor communication. PSG College of Pharmacy conducted world pharmacist day observed on September 25 at PSGIMS&R which highlights Safe and effective medicines for all.



The theme were divided in to different segments .The posters regarding

1. Safe and effective administration of medicines in chronic disease.
2. Safe administration of drugs in pediatric.
3. Storage of medicines.
4. Safe disposal of medicines
5. Over the counter drug consequences (eg: Antibiotics) were displayed



Several decades of research indicate that up to 20% of all patients do not fill a new prescription, and approximately one-half of those who do fill a new prescription discontinue therapy in the first 6 months. Motivational interviewing was given to the patient as well as to the family members for improving medication adherence including exercise, and dieting in chronic condition like diabetes , hypertension etc.

In pediatric population while using solution, emulsion, suspension risk for incorrect shaking/segmentation resulting in incorrect doses. Counting errors will arise due to variable drop size. Some formulations which need for reconstitution with clean water dummy samples demo were given and explained how to overcome the administration error.




Different formulation like nasal spray, nasal drops, inhalers, eye drops, usage were well defined.

The community were educated the safety concerns associated with the three most common OTC analgesics: acetaminophen (liver concerns), nonsteroidal anti-inflammatory drugs (NSAIDs) (liver and kidney concerns, in addition to interactions with other medications and in patients with hypertension) and salicylates (bleeding complications and stomach ulcer concerns).

The population were advised importance of storing medicines properly due to the stability/effectiveness. Commonly used medicines storing them at the correct temperature, for example, OTC and those medicines requiring refrigeration, instructed it should be stored in their original container in a cool, dry and secure place and to read the medicine label.

Ensured to ask the pharmacist instruction regarding FDA flush list not under flush drugs for the safe disposal which medication they are receiving from pharmacy. It was emphasized to delete all personal information on the prescription label of empty medicine bottles or medicine packaging, then trash or recycle the empty bottle or packaging. Simple steps to dispose of most medicines in trash at home were discussed.

Nearly 160 population were attended and benefited through this programme.

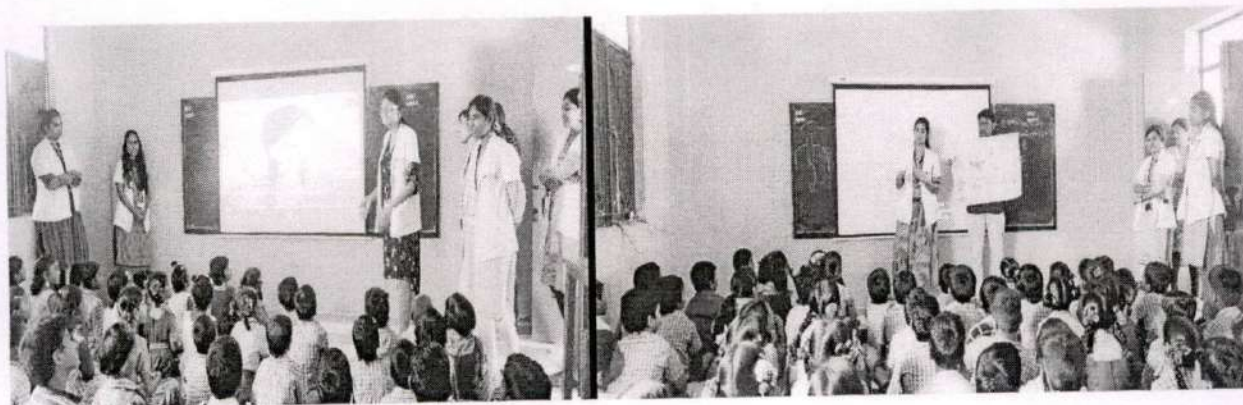

During past five decades, dengue fever (DF) has increased rapidly up to 30-fold, making it a global public health concern in the world. It has been reported that 128 countries all over the world. Limited awareness and nonsystematized health education programmes have contributed adversely to the increase in dengue incidence and limited attention which has positively contributed to the increase in vector receptivity.



Schools can serve as key locations for health promotion and disease prevention activities. Education serves as a basis for an ability of an individual to identify and deal with vector habitats, and use preventive measures. This programme emphasized that in order to control dengue, and provided necessary measures for the destruction of vector habitats.

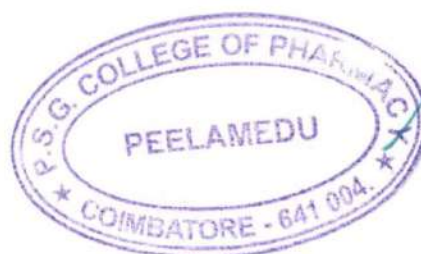
We have conducted awareness programme at Coimbatore Corporation School located near Ramanathapuram, Coimbatore with the strength of 235 children's from first standard to fifth standard. Children spend a considerable amount of time in the school as well as outside environment, which can facilitate the transmission of certain illnesses. Education regarding disease transmitted by mosquito vectors belonging to genus *Aedes* and mode of transmission, symptoms, risk factor, traditional management prevention and environmental measures were educated through chart display, animated videos. It was clearly said how health education and



personal sanitation are necessary initial steps in modern control of mosquito borne diseases, as it involves removal of possible breeding sites of larvae so. The existing level of awareness of dengue infection and knowledge after health education were assessed to determine the effectiveness of awareness programmes followed by drawing competition was conducted and prizes were distributed for best three drawings and all the participants were received appreciation prize.

Health is a fundamental human right and a global social goal. It is pertinent for the realization of basic human needs and for a better quality of life.

Health is a causative factor that affects country's aggregate level of economic growth. Since development is a consequence of good health, even the poorest developing countries should make it a priority to invest in the health sector. Unfortunately, health has been poorly invested in by countries with low human development, and the health sector still remains largely untapped and continues to suffer neglect.

In 2014, 58% Indians in rural areas and 68% in urban areas said they use private facilities for inpatient care, according to the 71st round of the National Sample Survey Source.

Various studies have shown the rising out-of-pocket expenditures on healthcare is pushing around 32-39 million Indians below the poverty line annually.



55 million Indians were pushed into poverty in a single year due to unaffordable healthcare. 33 out of 55 million fell under the poverty line due to expenditure on medicines alone.(Public health foundation of India, 2018).

Health care should be within the reach of every citizen. For providing basic health facilities to all citizens, Indian government has introduced and implemented various health schemes and programmes. Based on all findings the team selected health schemes awareness should reach the door steps of the community. Ayushman Bharat Pradhan Mantri Jan Arogya Yojana (PM-JAY) is a pioneer programme initiated by Government of India to ensure that the lower section of the society, the poor and vulnerable population get proper health cover and Janani Suraksha Yojana (JSY) is a safe motherhood intervention under the National Rural Health Mission (NRHM) being implemented with the objective of reducing maternal and neo-natal mortality by promoting institutional delivery among the poor pregnant women. JSY is a 100 % centrally sponsored scheme and it integrates cash assistance with delivery and post-delivery care was explained to the Sudaplayam & Attukal village. The team provided information pertaining to policies, schemes, forms etc. for specific beneficiaries which include women, children, senior citizen, etc.



Dengue is a mosquito borne disease transmitted by the Aedes mosquito. It is a febrile illness affecting infants, young children and adults. Dengue is a worldwide problem, affecting the tropical and sub-tropical regions, mostly the urban and semi-urban areas. The incidence of dengue has grown dramatically around the world in recent decades.

Not only is the number of cases increasing as the disease spreads to new areas, but explosive outbreaks are occurring. This disease presents with mild fever, which would reach higher temperature, severe headache pain behind the eyes, muscles and joint pain and rashes. Annually, 100 million cases of dengue fever and half a million cases of DHF occur worldwide. Ninety percent of DHF subjects are children less than 15 years of age. At present, dengue is endemic in 112 countries in the world.

South-East Asia is one of the regions with highest risk of DF/DHF, accounting for 52% of the global risk.

Health education is essential for the control of diseases such as dengue, ensuring that community members understand the mechanisms of infection and the key behaviors or activities that need to be addressed to prevent transmission, reduce severe disease and avoid fatalities. There is no available vaccine against the virus. In addition to this the anti-viral medications are also not available.

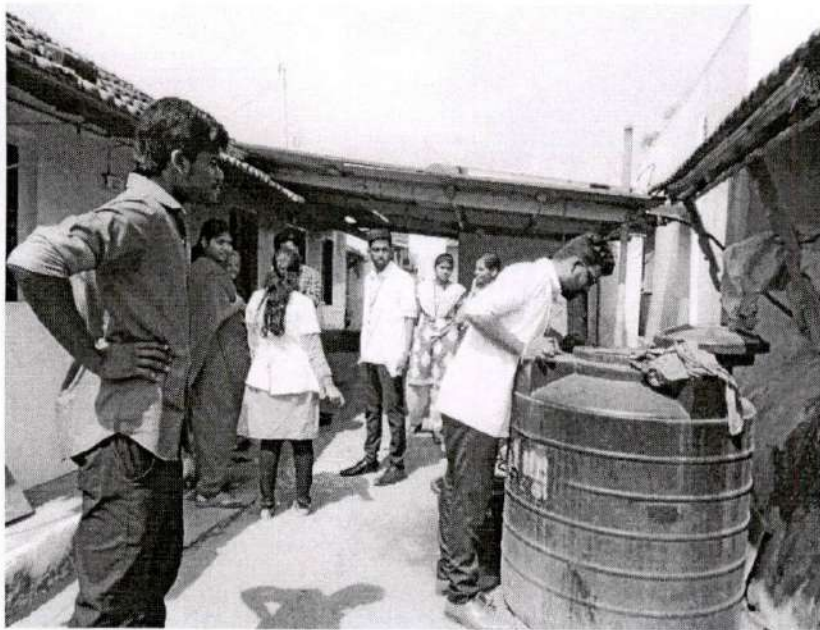
Creating awareness on Dengue Fever is the only effective way of preventing Dengue Fever.

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Dengue fever spread higher in this particular season and hence in order to prevent the spread of dengue awareness programme was conducted among the public of Sundapalyam and Attukal village. Dengue prevention and control were explained to the community to eliminate the places where the mosquito lays eggs, primarily artificial containers that hold water.




There are over 355 million menstruating women and girls in India, but millions of women across the country still face significant barriers to a comfortable and dignified experience with menstrual hygiene management (MHM). 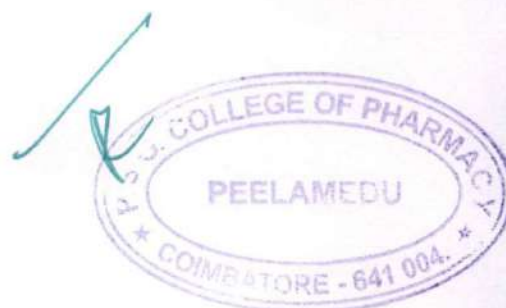

Immunization awareness:

Immunization forms the major focus of child survival programmes throughout the world. Roughly 3 million children die each year of vaccine preventable diseases (VPDs) with a disproportionate number of these children residing in developing countries. Recent estimates suggest that approximately 34 million children are not completely immunized with almost 98 % of them residing in developing countries.

Vaccination coverage in India is also far from complete despite the long-standing commitment to universal coverage. While gains in coverage proved to be rapid throughout the 1980s, taking off from a below 20 % coverage to about 60 % coverage for some VPDs, subsequent gains have been limited. Immunization against common childhood diseases has been an integral component of mother and child health services in India since adoption of the primary health care approach in 1978 being reinforced by the Declaration of Health Policy in 1983.

Government of India (GoI) launched the Expanded Programme on Immunization in 1978 to protect children against diphtheria, pertusis, tetanus, and typhoid. Vaccination against polio through oral polio vaccine (OPV) was added to the programme in 1979-80 and BCG vaccination against tuberculosis was added in 1981-82.



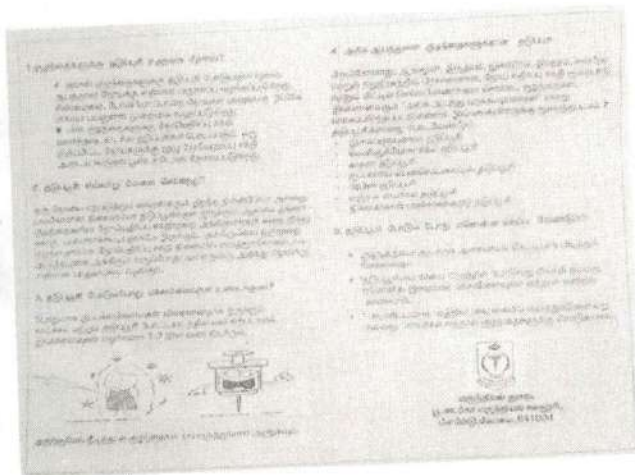


Vaccination against measles was included in 1985-86. In 1985, the Universal Immunization Programme (UIP) was launched to protect all infants (0-12 months) against six serious but preventable diseases, namely, tuberculosis, diphtheria, pertussis, tetanus, poliomyelitis, and measles.

The objective of the programme was to fully vaccinate at least 85% of all infants of the age of one year. In subsequent years, the goal of UIP was raised to ensure 100% coverage of all eligible children with one dose of BCG, three doses of DPT and OPV, and one dose of the measles vaccine.



A team of 10 Interns visited Vedapatti village and created doorstep awareness to nearly 33 houses. Questionnaire was prepared to evaluate awareness among those populations regarding immunization. It was found that among 33 houses, 27 were already aware on immunization and only 2 were not aware. Pamphlets with the detail of immunization schedule and its importance was also delivered to each house.

Over-the-Counter (OTC) Medicines:

The trend of 'Over-the-Counter (OTC) Medicines' use has grown steadily in the last few years. Various reasons such as easy availability, affordability, and increased awareness among patients are responsible for this trend. OTC medicines or nonprescription medicines are terms used interchangeably to refer to medicines that can be bought without a prescription.

Many countries recognize OTC medicines as a separate category of drugs and have established regulations for their use. In India, till date there are no guidelines for licensing of OTC medicines. There is no separate category allotted for OTC medicines in India and the drugs which do not come under the prescription medicines schedule are generally sold as over-the-counter medicines.

A study by Phalke *et al.* reported prevalence of self-medication in rural population of state of Maharashtra in India to be 81.5%. However, in Tamil Nadu, only 23% of the rural population resorted to self-medication or household remedies and almost 77% consulted a doctor for their ailment.

The prevalence of self-medication in Urban Delhi was found to be 92.8%, whereas a study conducted at Behrampur in Odhisha found the prevalence of OTC medication use to be 18.72%. Overall, 52% Indians were estimated to self-medicate in India according to a web portal-based survey of 20000 people across 10 cities. The reasons given were lack of time; need to avoid doctors' fees, and dependence of internet.



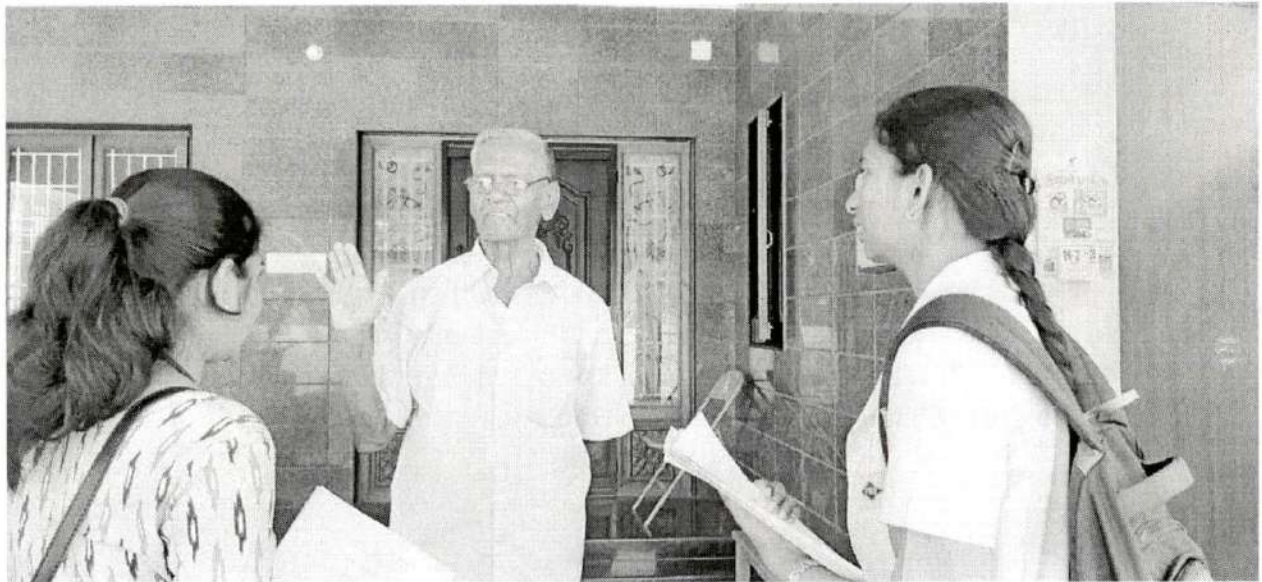
One Indian study reported that more than 90% of the qualified pharmacists interviewed in their study were aware about the concept of OTC drugs, 96.5% asked the patients their complaints when they were approached for purchase of OTC drugs, but only 51% counseled the patients regarding instructions for use.

The Indian pharma market generated total revenues of 1.8 billion in 2009 from the drugs presumed to be OTC with an annual growth rate of 10.7%. Organization for Pharmaceutical Producers of India (OPPI) has proposed that policies should be developed for drug classification, labeling, licensing, distribution, and pricing of OTCs.

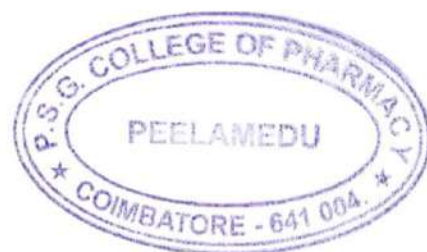


As per the National survey data submitted by Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services administration (SAMHSA) in US, about 3.1 million people aged 12 years and older have misused OTC medications at least once in their lifetime (3.7% in <18 years old). In India, abuse of OTC medicines is not well documented. One report mentions that cough syrups and antihistamine medications sold over the counter are a prevalent form of drug abuse in India.





Questionnaire was created by Interns to evaluate the knowledge on OTC medication among public of Vedapatti village. 33 houses in that village was visited and it was found that 11 use OTC medication and 20 do not use OTC medications. Following that awareness regarding overuse of OTC medications and its hazardous effects were explained to the public.



1. Why does my baby need vaccination?

Your child needs vaccination as it provides a thorough defense (or immunity) against a potentially deadly disease. It has proven to be the most effective method to stop the spread of infectious diseases like smallpox, polio etc.

Children are injected with certain vaccines as soon as their immune systems have developed sufficiently. Additional 'booster' shots are also required to achieve full immunity to a particular diseases.

2. How do vaccines work?

Vaccines basically consist of either a WEAKENED OR DEAD VERSION of the disease causing virus . But your baby's immune system is fully capable of recognizing and dealing with these threats. And once your baby's immune system has dealt with the virus, it keeps a record of it in the immune system and capable of identifying & dealing with similar threats in the future.

3. Are there any SIDE EFFECTS after Immunization?

Common side-effects following vaccination are mild and fleeting in nature.

They usually last for 1-2 days after immunization.

The side-effects can range from *mild fever to pain at the injection site*. If the symptoms persist for more than a few days, please consult your paediatrician for further advice

4 .Vaccines for high-risk children

A child is classified as 'high-risk' when he/she has a congenital disorder, a weak immune system (including HIV), asthma, heart/lung problems, blood, liver and kidney diseases and even children who have pets at home.

IAP recommends at least 7 vaccines for children belonging to the *high-risk category*:

- ✓Influenza Vaccine
- ✓Meningococcal Vaccine
- ✓Japanese Encephalitis Vaccine
- ✓Cholera Vaccine
- ✓Rabies Vaccine
- ✓Yellow Fever Vaccine
- ✓Pneumococcal Polysaccharide Vaccine



5. Safe Vaccination Practices

- Hold the child tight and don't let him move while administering the vaccine as the injection may cut through the skin.
- Always prefer administering vaccines in morning time as you get ample time until night to see if there are any allergies or ill-effects and you can immediately seek medical help if there are any such symptoms.
- Always keep paracetamol handy to help the child overcome fever and pain, if it shows up after vaccination.

1. குழந்தைகளுக்கு தடுப்பூசி எதற்காக தேவை?

தங்கள் குழந்தைகளுக்கு தடுப்பூசி போடுவதன் மூலம், ஆபத்தான நோய்க்கு எதிரான பாதுகாப்பு வழங்கப்படுகிறது. சின்னம்மை, போலியோ போன்ற நோய்கள் பரவுவதை தடுக்க மிகவும் பயனுள்ள முறையாக கருதப்படுகிறது.

பின் குழந்தைகளுக்கு நோயெதிர்ப்பு சக்தி வளர்ந்தவுடன், சில தடுப்பூசிகள் போடப்படும். ஒரு குறிப்பிட்ட நோய்களுக்கு முழு நோயெதிர்ப்பு சக்தி அடைய கூடுதல் பூஸ்டர் டோஸ் தேவைப்படுகிறது.

2. தடுப்பூசி எவ்வாறு வேலை செய்கிறது?

ஒரு நோயை ஏற்படுத்தும் வைரஸ்கிருமி இறந்த நிலையிலோ அல்லது பலவீனமான நிலையிலோ தடுப்பூசிக்குள் இருக்கும். ஆனால் தங்கள் குழந்தைகளின் நோயெதிர்ப்பு சக்திமுறை அக்கிருமியைக் கண்டறிந்து நன்கு கையாளக்கூடியதாகவே இருக்கும். அக்கிருமியை ஒருமுறை குழந்தைகளின் நோயெதிர்ப்பு சக்தி நினைவில் வைத்துக்கொண்டால் அடுத்தமுறை அக்கிருமி வரும்போது அதை நன்கு அறிந்து நோய்க்கு எதிரான பாதுகாப்பை வழங்கும்.

3. தடுப்பூசி போடும்போது பக்கவிளைவுகள் உண்டாகுமா?

பொதுவாக இப்பக்கவிளைவுகள் விரைவானதாக இருக்கும். காய்ச்சல் மற்றும் தடுப்பூசி போட்டயிடத்தில் வலி ஏற்படலாம். இவ்விளைவுகள் வழக்கமாக 1-2 நாள் வரை நீடிக்கும்,



அதற்குமேல் நீடித்தால் குழந்தைகள் நல மருத்துவரை அணுகவும்.
