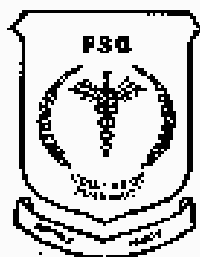

2.2 Attendance requirement

For B.Pharm & M.Pharm each semester shall consist of not less than 100 working days. The odd semester shall be conducted from the month of June/July to November/December and the even semesters shall be conducted from December/January to

May/June in every calendar year. **A candidate is required to put in atleast 80% attendance in individual courses considering theory and practical separately.**

For Pharm D each academic year shall consist of not less than 270 days(inclusive of the University exam days). **A candidate is required to put in a minimum of 80% of attendance in both theory and practical separately in each subject before admission to the examination for all the years to study in the Pharm.D & Pharm.D. (Post Baccalaureate) Degree Courses of this University.**

Note:

- ★ Minimum percentage of attendance is required separately for theory and practical in each subject.
- ★ Only those students who meet the above requirement in all the subjects each year will be eligible to appear for University examination as well as the sessional examination.

2.3 Leave

Students who wish to avail leave for themselves should submit the leave application to their respective class coordinator. The coordinator will monitor the attendance and punctuality of students. In case of irregular attendance, the parent of the student will be informed. Disciplinary action will be taken if the reasons claimed by the student or his parent are not satisfactory.

A student who is abstaining from classes in one or more subjects (theory or practical) continuously for ten classes, without prior sanction of leave by the Principal will be terminated from the college without any notice.

2.4 Punctuality

Students should be present in the classroom at the scheduled time. A grace period of 5 minutes will be granted to the students and those students who come late by more than 5 minutes will not be allowed to attend the classes.

2.5 Uniform

Students are expected to wear the uniform while coming to the college. A fine of Rs. **50/-** per day will be levied as penalty for not wearing uniform / overcoat. Students should come in shoes and should have their ID card.

2.6 Library

Students should make the utmost use of the library facilities. A minimum of 2 books can be taken from the library for not more than 7 days. Library will be opened from 8.00 A.M. to 12.00 midnight throughout the year. Locker system is provided in the central library. The locker can be given to the students and it should be renewed every month. The key for the locker is available with the librarian and it can be obtained by showing the college identity card.

2.7 Practical Classes

It is advised that students should come to the practical classes by preparing themselves with adequate information regarding theoretical principles. Observation, reading, calculation and result of each practical should be recorded in the observation book and on the next day it should be written in the fair record book and the teacher will value the record. Marks will be given for each exercise which will form the basis of internal assessment mark for record work.

Costly glass apparatus and equipments are being supplied to the students and the market price of each item will be levied from those who break the glass wares or instruments. For this, a breakage register will be maintained.

Fine will also be levied from those who misuse weighing balances, weight boxes, instruments etc,

3. Ragging

3.1 Introduction

WHAT IS RAGGING?

“Any disorderly, whether by words spoken or written, or by an act which has the effect of teasing, treating or handling with rudeness any other student, indulging in rowdy or undisciplined activities which causes or is likely to cause annoyance, hardship or psychological harm or to raise apprehension thereof in a fresher or a junior student or asking the students to do any act or perform something which such student will not in the ordinary course and which has the effect of causing or generating a sense of shame or embarrassment so as to adversely affect the physique or psyche of a fresher or a junior student” Hon'ble Supreme court.

Thus, ragging includes:

- Act of physical and sexual abuse, homosexual assault, stripping, forcing obscene and lewd acts, gestures, causing bodily harm or any other danger to health.
- Act of abuse by spoken words, emails, snail-mails, public insults, perverted pleasures, vicarious or sadistic feel from actively or passively participating in the discomfiture to others.
- Exploiting the services of junior students for completing the academic tasks by the seniors.
- Act of financial extortion or forceful expenditure.
- Any act that affects the mental health and self confidence of students

3.2 Terms of Punishment of Ragging

Categories of ragging and punishment

a. Verbal Ragging

When senior causes mental harassment, discomfort for the junior by forcing him/her to answer unacceptable/personal questions, dance, sing, etc. is said to rag the junior. It also includes within its ambit cyber ragging.

♦ **Punishment:** 1 year imprisonment or fine or both

b. Severe Verbal Ragging:

Where the mental harassment, discomfort is to such an act as forces the junior to withdraw from the college

♦ **Punishment:** 7 year imprisonment with fine.

c. Physical Ragging:

Any act by the senior towards the junior which inflicts bodily injury on the junior. Like beating the junior, hitting him/her with objects etc.

♦ **Punishment:** 7 year imprisonment with fine.

d. Sexual Ragging:

Where the senior asks the junior to do an act which damages sexual dignity of the junior.

♦ **Punishment:** 7 year rigorous imprisonment and fine.

3.3 In order to prevent Ragging the following measures are enforced

- A. To provide assurance to the applicants of the course that the campus will be a ragging- free campus by publishing all the measures in prospectus and application form
- B. To constantly monitor the college, the hostel and the campus
- C. To award extreme punishment to the offenders
- D. To provide a fearless atmosphere to the freshers to report any case of ragging
- E. To Educate the seniors, freshers and the parents about Ragging, its ill effects and consequences
- F. To provide the phone numbers (including mobile phone numbers) of the concerned faculty members so that reporting of ragging cases becomes easy
- G. Also to publicize the fact that complaints can be made directly to the police

3.4 To execute the above objectives the following committees have been formed

- a. **Appellate Body**

The appellate body will take the final decision on any punishment awarded for ragging in the college. A convicted student along with his/her parent can apply to the appellate body for revision of the case disposed by the Anti Ragging Committee of the College.

4. Institutional Committees

a. Anti Ragging Committee

The antiragging committee will hold enquiry into any ragging activity which is brought into its consideration by the Hostel Committee or Institutional Committee or directly by any student or parent or any member of faculty or non-teaching staff or any person

After conducting proper enquiry the committee will take appropriate decision including punishment and that will be communicated to the accused and his/her parents as early as possible

b. The Hostel Committee

The hostel committee members, respective boys & girls, hostel warden will visit the hostel everyday and monitor the movements and activities of the students. They will take all precautionary measures to prevent ragging. They will report even any minor ragging activity in the hostel to the anti ragging committee immediately

c. Institutional Committee

The institutional Committee will make vigil in the premises of the college to provide all protection to the fresher. They will provide all the necessary guidelines and orientation to the fresher. Moreover they will conduct awareness lectures and necessary publication of anti ragging measures and consequences of ragging to the seniors well in advance to prevent any type of ragging. Class coordinators of B.Pharm & Pharm D will serve as the member of the institutional committee.

d. Disciplinary Committee

A committee has been framed to deal with breaches [act of breaking or failing to obey a rule] of any non academic regulation. It consists of

- Chairman : Vice Principal
- Top Management : General Manager, PSG IMS&R
- Other members : Both boys and girls hostel warden
- Convener : Student welfare in-charge

Depending upon the appeal of complaints/misconduct of the student(s) the following members will be invited to the committee meetings.

- Hostel Managers (Both boys and girls)
- Law officer
- Respective class teachers
- Parents
- Member outside the PSGCP

The conduct of hearing and decisions regarding procedure are at the discretion of the chair, who is free to act flexibly within the confines of good order and fairness. The panel hears the case in its entirety and reaches an independent decision as to whether the student has violated the community's standards of conduct or college policy and if necessary determines an appropriate sanction. The panel makes its decisions without reference to civil or criminal court proceedings. Decisions of the panel are final ; an appellant cannot afterwards choose to revert to the principal's final decision.

Finalizing the penalties Principal may consider include but are not limited to:

- Disciplinary warning (a letter from the Principal, a personal interview or both);
- Disciplinary probation for a specified period (sometimes with specified conditions, e.g., loss of eligibility to represent the College, restrictions of extra-curricular activities);
- Payment of a fine or restitution;
- Suspension for a specified time;
- or Permanent expulsion

e. Anti ragging squads

An Anti ragging squad consisting of at least 3 faculty members and they will closely watch the movements of freshers in the campus at least for one month and take necessary measures to prevent ragging and any untoward incident will be reported to the Anti ragging Committee

f. Contact details

A committee consisting of final B.Pharm students will be constituted to educate the student community about the ill effects of ragging and consequences and to build up confidence among the juniors. Necessary orientation programs will be conducted for these committee members.

g. Redressal Committee for Examination and Evaluation

Student redress and grievance pertaining to conduct of examination & evaluation will be addressed to the Convener, Examination committee. The complaint should be given in written format. Complaints will be filed in the register supported by the student's written complaint letter. Necessary action will be taken after informing the Principal and discussion with the members of redressal committee for examination and evaluation.

h. Students grievance Committee with Academics

Student's grievance pertaining to academics will be addressed to the Convener, Academic committee. The complaint should be given in written format. Complaints will be filed in the register supported by the student's written complaint letter. Necessary action will be taken after informing the Principal and discussion with the members of the Students grievance Committee for Academics.

i. Internal Complaint Committee

Internal complaint committee play a critical role in Gender Sensitization, prevention of sexual harassment and student grievance redressal. This policy is meant to sensitize the employees and students about their fundamental rights to have safe and healthy environment. The ICC Cell can be approached both by students and employees to voice their grievances. Suggestion boxes are provided in every floor of the Pharmacy College. The students can express their constructive suggestions and drop them in the box. Any oral complaints are also redressed. They are enquired and scrutinized by the ICC committee with utmost confidentiality. Apart from this, there are Mentors, Class coordinators, Department Heads are also available to tackle departmental issues.

5.3 Sessional Exams

- a. Sessional exams will be conducted as per the dates mentioned in the Academic Calendar.
- b. If any of the mentioned dates happens to be a holiday, the examination of that day will be conducted on the next available working day.
- c. There will not be any class during theory examination but, theory classes will be held during practical examinations. Sessional practical exams will be conducted one week prior to the sessional theory examination.
- d. Updated practical record should be submitted during the Sessional practical examination for evaluation.

RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR SESSIONAL EXAMINATION

- 1) Students are directed to attend all the 2 Sessional examinations of B. Pharm and 3 sessional exam for Pharm D course **without fail**.
- 2) The reason for the absence during Sessional examination must be explained through a written letter to the Principal by **the parent or guardian (Foreign students) of the student**.
- 3) Students are not allowed to bring calculator (except for biostatistics), cell phones, pagers and digital diaries etc. inside the examination hall

5.4 Minimum Marks to pass the University Examination

B. Pharm

A student shall be declared PASS and eligible for getting grade in a course of B.Pharm. program if he/she secures at least 50% marks in that particular course including internal assessment. For example, to be declared as PASS and to get grade, the student has to secure a minimum of 50 marks for the total of 100 including continuous mode of assessment and end semester theory examination and has to secure a minimum of 25 marks for the total 50 including internal assessment and end semester practical examination.

Pharm. D

There are no minimum marks to score in IA, Written theory & Practicals. However pass in a subject will be declared only if the student secure 50% marks in total in total put together IA & Written exam

5.5 Break System for B. Pharm and Pharm D**B. Pharm**

A student shall be eligible to carry forward all the courses of I, II and III semesters till the IV semester examinations. However, he/she shall not be eligible to attend the courses of V semester until all the courses of I and II semesters are successfully completed.

A student shall be eligible to carry forward all the courses of III, IV and V semesters till the VI semester examinations. However, he/she shall not be eligible to attend the courses of VII semester until all the courses of I, II, III and IV semesters are successfully completed.

A student shall be eligible to carry forward all the courses of V, VI and VII semesters till the VIII semester examinations. However, he/she shall not be eligible to get the course completion certificate until all the courses of I, II, III, IV, V and VI semesters are successfully completed.

A student shall be eligible to get his/her CGPA upon successful completion of the courses of I to VIII semesters within the stipulated time period as per the norms specified in 26.*

A lateral entry student shall be eligible to carry forward all the courses of III, IV and V semesters till the VI semester examinations. However, he/she shall not be eligible to attend the courses of VII semester until all the courses of III and IV semesters are successfully completed.

A lateral entry student shall be eligible to carry forward all the courses of V, VI and VII semesters till the VIII semester examinations. However, he/she shall not be eligible to get the course completion certificate until all the courses of III, IV, V and VI semesters are successfully completed.

A lateral entry student shall be eligible to get his/her CGPA upon successful completion of the courses of III to VIII semesters within the stipulated time period as per the norms specified in 26. *

Any student who has given more than 4 chances for successful completion of I / III semester courses and more than 3 chances for successful completion of II / IV semester courses shall be permitted to attend V / VII semester classes ONLY during the subsequent academic year as the case may be. In simpler terms there shall NOT be any ODD BATCH for any semester.

Note:

* **Norms 26:** The duration for the completion of the program shall be fixed as double the actual duration of the program and the students have to pass within the said period, otherwise they have to get fresh Registration.

Grade AB should be considered as failed and treated as one head for deciding academic progression. Such rules are also applicable for those students who fail to register for examination(s) of any course in any semester.

Pharm D

As per minutes of meeting of 39th Standing academic board meeting held on 21.6.2010 following regulations were considered for break of study in Pharm D

- a. Candidates should pass all first and second year subjects before entering the third year of study.
- b. Candidates can carry two subjects of the third year while entering the fourth year of the study and should pass the same before appearing for the fourth year examinations.
- c. Students should complete and pass the course within 8 years from date of admission.

5.6 Registration

All candidates admitted to I B.Pharm, II B.Pharm (Lateral Entry), I Pharm D and Pharm D Post Baccalaureate should enroll and register in the University on or

before December of that academic year. Necessary registration form may be obtained from the office and must be duly filled and submitted.

5.7 University Examination

Application for University Examination should be filled and submitted along with the examination fee at the required time.

5.8 University Exam Fees

University examination fees details will be notified from time to time as per university regulations

6. Student welfare activities

6.1. Student Council

The Student's council is an association comprised of representatives elected by the students of PSGCP. The council was established in 2008 under the guidance of the faculty and runs under the basic principle of "Students Welfare". The council was constituted to encourage the students to take part in extracurricular activities other than their dedication to academics. It conducts annual college activities like culturals, sports, college day, graduation day and also organizes student's welfare and developmental programs such as seminars, welfare activities, personality development, career opportunity activities, etc. These activities enable the student to develop leadership qualities, organization and communication skills. Care is also taken that the maximum number of students takes part either directly or indirectly in the functioning of the Students Council.

6.2. Mentorship

Student Counseling Cell has been established to provide individual attention and guidance to the students in solving their specific problems related to academics, personal, psychological etc. so that they are able to achieve academic excellence, develop an integrated personality during their stay on the campus. A maximum of 11 or 13 students (B. Pharmacy / Pharm D) will be allotted to each teacher and the students can obtain guidance and proper advice from that teacher.

The deviations of the individual students and the drawbacks identified by the faculty/mentor and the remedial actions are taken immediately and the parents are also briefed if necessary and accordingly.

6.3. Hostels

Mr. M.Ram Pravin Kumar, Asst. Professor and Dr.G.Syamala, Associate Professor are wardens for pharmacy students who will look after facilities and the problems of the hostel mates. The rules & regulations of the hostel should be followed strictly.

6.4. Sports, Games and Physical Training

Mr. P. T. Palanisamy, Director of Physical Education, will provide adequate coaching in sports & games. Facilities are available for physical and games training. Students have to attend the training classes conducted once in a week in sports uniform which will be supplied from the stores at a nominal cost.

6.5. N.S.S. Unit

N.S.S. Unit attached to The Tamilnadu Dr. M.G.R. Medical University, Chennai is functioning. It is proposed to conduct various socially relevant programs. Mr. D. Sivakumar, NSS Programme Officer will organize various events.

6.6. Voluntary Blood Donors Club, Red Ribbon Club & Youth Red Cross Unit

Voluntary Blood Donors Club, Red Ribbon Club and Youth Red Cross Unit are engaged in various community linked activities.

6.7. Nature club

It aims at creating awareness among the students about the importance of nature and to preserve the rural characteristics and natural diversity of the threatened spots & species.

6.8. Sir Raman's Science club

An active and fully functional Sir Raman's Science Club has been established to provide opportunities for students to explore science. The science club focuses on enriching students' lives through extracurricular activities related to recent trends in

pharmaceutical science and it allows students who share a common interest in the sciences to get together outside of classroom hours.

The club works to build a budding scientist community at the college by organizing seminars, quiz competitions, debates etc.

6.9. Chemmozhi Peravai

Various events like Debate Elocution, Essay writing will be conducted for students highlighting the tamil tradition and its culture.

6.10. Last Date for Payment of Fees

Tuition Fee, Special Fee, Mess fee & Hostel Fees has to be paid every year on or before 31st July
